- To provide a platform for composers to present and, hopefully, to discuss their work.

Welcome to the 4th LFCCM

The 2005 Festival represents a significant step forward on a variety of fronts, including the presence of a growing number of international artists, further community and education links, a developing teatime concert offering and three commissions, including a set of evening canticles by Diana Burrell.

Through the generosity of several members of the congregation at St Pancras we have been able to commission three new works. Diana Burrell's canticles will be given their broadcast premiere live on BBC Radio 3 on 11th May: coincidentally the same day that the Bach Choir will be premiering another work of hers at the RFH in the evening. The introduction of Compline to the 2005 LFCCM (21.00 on 9th May) has given us the opportunity of commissioning two smaller works, Te lucis ante terminum and Save us, O Lord, by Paul Ayres and David Buckley, respectively, and we look forward to hearing all these works within and beyond this year's festival.

Education is a key part of the Festival, and it is very pleasing indeed to build upon the successes of the 2004 event. Alongside the Composers' Masterclass and the Contemporary Dance and Composition Event, I wish to draw attention to the Music & Faith Seminar and the Schools' Education Project with the Foundling Museum. The Music & Faith Seminar is led by Dr Robert Sholl, a musicologist and performer who is well known for his work on Messiaen. With the aid of various panel members Robert will be discussing, amongst other issues, the creative tensions experienced by composers of sacred/church music in a secular age. The collaboration with the Foundling Museum and some nearby schools, led by Paul Ayres, offers exciting prospects for this year's Schools' Project, and we hope that a number of other liaisons will come from this in the future.

The Festival is fortunate to enjoy the support of a growing number of composers, ranging from those at the start of their careers to those with significant international reputations, and it is particularly pleasing that so many of these people have found time to come and support events in recent years. Of the 44 works performed during the 2004 Festival, 17 were premieres, and 13 of these were world premieres.

We are delighted to welcome a number of high profile performers to this year's Festival. Space does not allow me to say enough about many of these, but I'm sure you will be delighted to see that there are concerts by The Clerks Group, Pegasus Chamber Choir, UCL Chamber Choir, 15B Consort, Susanne Stanzeleit & Julian Jacobson and the LCMM String Ensemble.

At the time of going to press the Festival wishes to acknowledge the financial generosity of a number of funding bodies, including St Pancras PCC, The Holst Foundation, The RVW Trust, The Thanet Street Trust and the Performing Rights Society Foundation, without which such a programme would be impossible.

The services, which form the backbone of the Festival, focus on Ascensiontide and Pentecost, and I hope you will find this year's programme as a whole is exciting and challenging in many ways.

I look forward to meeting you at the 2005 LFCCM, and hope that the way in which we have put the programme together will enable you to take in more than one event.
